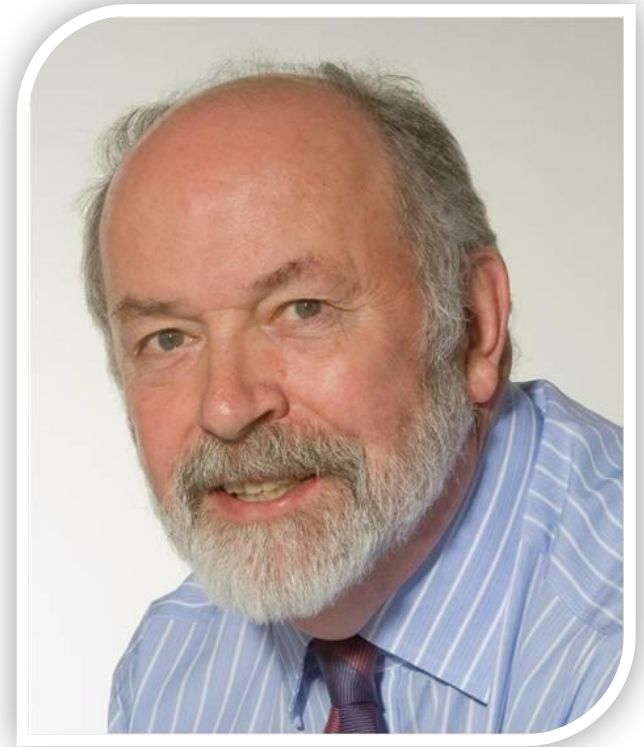

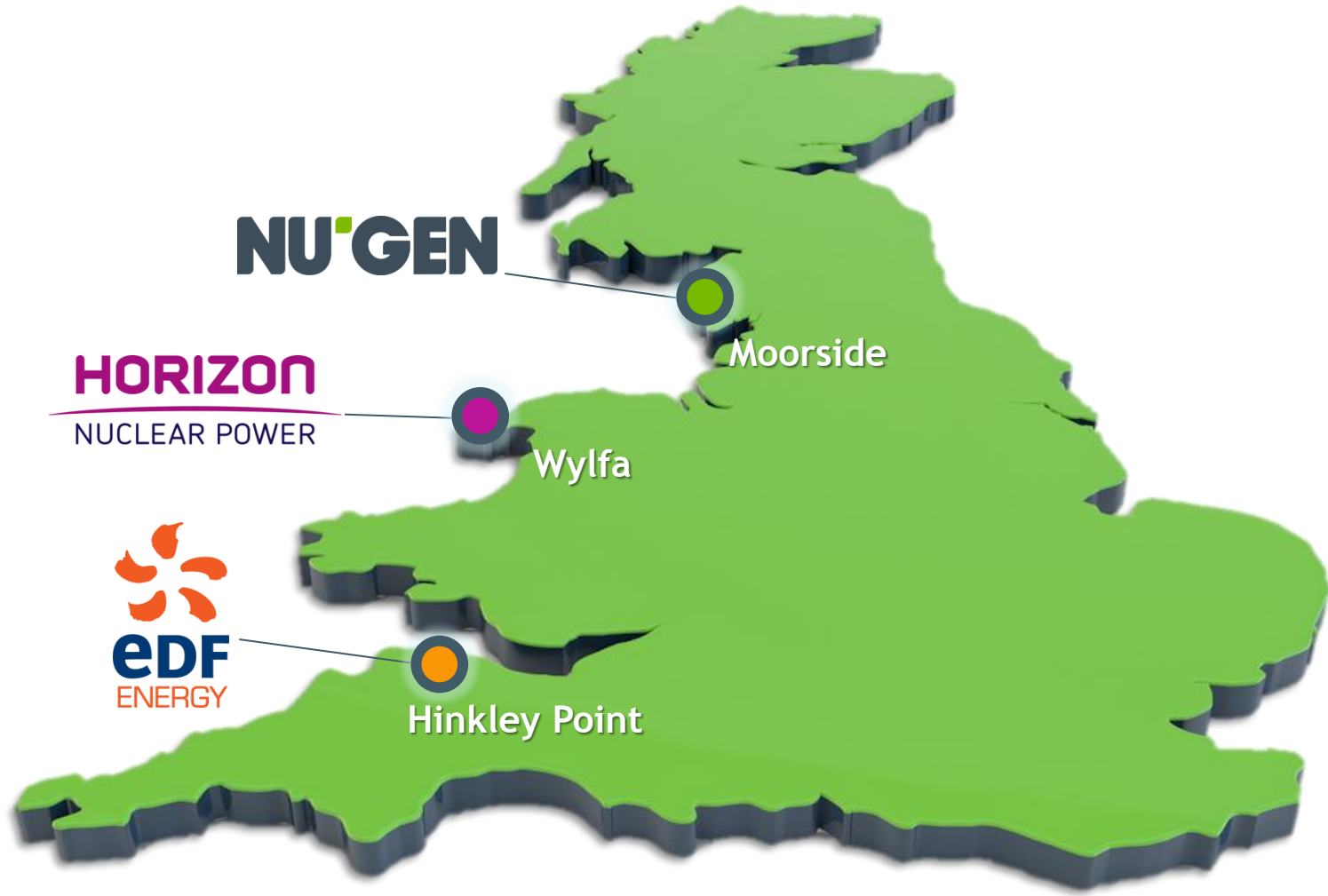

Moorside: New name unveiled for Nugen's nuclear new-build

MOORSIDE is the name on the cards for Copeland's new electricity-producing nuclear power station.

For now it will be the name of Nugen's reactor project. However, once the joint venture company makes the final decision to go ahead, as it hopes in 2015, the station itself will be christened Moorside.

It takes its name from a tenanted farm called Greenmoorside on part of the Sellafield area land where Nugen plans to build the station.

Detailed plans for a 3.6GW

reactor station are currently being prepared for developing the station on 200 hectares of land outside the present Sellafield licensed site. Nugen has an option to purchase land from the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority in a £70 million deal.

It is likely to be West Cumbria's biggest-ever private sector investment worth more than £5 billion at today's rates.

Some 5,000 construction jobs are forecast, another 800 in permanent operation and an extra 1,000 every time a reactor needs refuelling.

The company wants to use as much local labour as possible.

Local opinion was sought on the name choice, which Nugen says reflects local identity and regional aspirations.

Copeland MP Jamie Reed, who played a major role in convincing Nugen of Copeland's potential for new nuclear build, welcomes the name. The MP said: "Nugen is seeking to forge a long standing relationship with our community. Moorside is a good name, it's important to draw the distinction between the new nuclear build site and Sellafield."

And chairman of West Cumbria Stakeholders

Group, David Moore, said: "Nugen needs to have its own identity. Moorside is a good choice but why not consider using the full name of Greenmoorside? Green, in my opinion, is associated with new energy generation."

Copeland Council leader Elaine Woodburn: "Some will have strong views on the name but for me it's simply a positive that they're moving forward with the plans which will have a major economic impact for Copeland."

Nugen's chief operating director, Olivier Carret, said yesterday: "We're proud of a name which brings clarity and a distinct identity to the

nuclear new-build development.

"We will shortly be carrying out preliminary work on the site and it is important that our local community and national stakeholders recognise us. To be treated here in West Cumbria as a neighbour in an area full of experienced and well trained people is a priority for us."

Alfio Vidal, Nugen's chief nuclear director, said naming the project was an important part of the company's development plans. "It's important our project has a name. It gives momentum to developing solid relationships with the community and supply

chain.

"We think Moorside reflects the unique qualities of West Cumbria and our new project name marks a step forward in our development plans."

Having set up offices at Westlakes, Nugen has a programme of community meetings in place and will be taking forward supply chain development work during 2012.

Nugen will formally announce Moorside as the project name at the nuclear industry's major Energy Choices conference in London this afternoon (Thursday).
