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# What is the 'End State'?

- NDA requires the End State of a site to be reviewed, taking account of the views of local communities. It has issued guidance on how this should be done.
- The 'End State' of a site is defined by NDA in its guidance as **“the physical condition of the site at the point at which the NDA has finished its business”**

This means the options for the

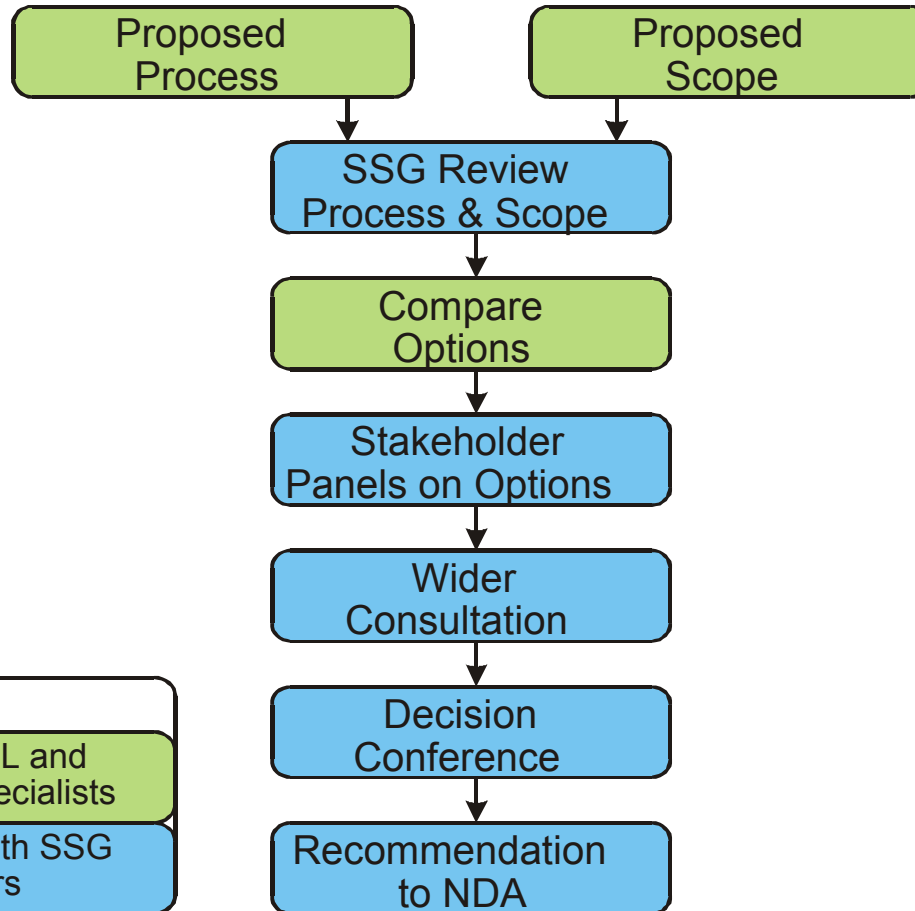
- infrastructure,
- engineered features (e.g. drains or 'caps'),
- disposed wastes and contamination, and
- condition of land

that remain when decommissioning and clean up is finished.

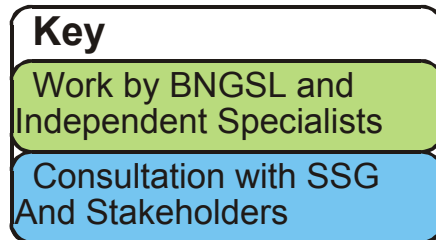
# Who is doing what?

- NDA has asked **Site Operators** to
  - Facilitate the process for consultation with the stakeholders
  - Provide technical expertise to define a range of feasible End State solutions
  - Engage stakeholders on End State solutions
- NDA has asked **Site Stakeholder Groups** to:
  - Agree a process for consultation including the wider local stakeholder community
  - Indicate Site End Uses that represents the desires of the broad range of local stakeholders
  - Provide NDA with feedback on End States

# Suggested process



The process adopts a **BPEO** approach, consistent with best practice, Government policy, regulatory guidance and NDA's guidance.
